RECREATION AND SOCIAL NEWS

Swimming Pool: Re-decking on the bridge between the pool and the parking lot is underway. The decking in the pool area will be done next year to free up some 2006 budget money for the re-activation of the fountain in the nearby pond. The pool will open early this year on May 19 and stay open for the 2 weekends after Labor Day. Elite Management is going to hire an Attendant (not Life Guard) to monitor pool use 10am-6pm. For security and safety reasons, we will use a combination lock this year and change the combination on July 1 and August 1. Our primary concern is having an open, unattended pool.

Derby Day Party: Permission was received from the Board of Directors to serve alcohol (beer, wine and bourbon) in the meeting house for this May 6th event. See enclosed flyer for further information.

Tag Sale? Rumors are flying that there may be another Community Tag Sale this year. Unlike last year's centralized sale down by the pool area, however, this year's event may allow each participating resident to conduct the sale at their home. The Conservancy Board of Directors is taking the matter under consideration and will be announcing their decision in the coming weeks.

Golf Outing: It's all set! Walden Woods will have their very first Golf Outing at the **Traditions Golf Course in Windsor on Sunday** afternoon, September 10th. Balanced teams of four will be arranged by individual average score to compete in a Scramble type tournament for fun and a few extraordinarily cheap prizes. A number of duplex and town-house model homes are now available for viewing by prospective buyers. Eleven of the homes have already been sold and all will be occupied this summer. Landscaping along what will be Scarlet Lane will be completed within 30 days.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION APPROVED

At the March 29th Special Homeowners Meeting that preceded the Board of Directors Meeting, the amended and re-written Certificate of Incorporation was unanimously approved by the homeowners in attendance. The certificate, a legal document that describes how the Walden Woods Conservancy operates as a Common Interest Community will now be registered with the state to replace the original certificate.

LANDSCAPING PLAN CHANGED

Ah, the best laid plans Due to the unexpected expense of replacing the meeting house doors that were damaged by high winds this winter, we will have to forego the meeting house landscaping upgrade planned for 2006. Living Today In Yesterday's Homes: That's the theme of Windsor Historical Society's house tour that will take place on Saturday, May 6th from 10 am until 4 pm. Six homes representing the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries will be open for visiting. Each of these homes is occupied by owners who love architecture and historic character and embrace adaptations for contemporary comfort. Once again the Windsor Historical Society is collaborating with the Windsor Jester's theatrical group whose members will portray early homeowners, greeting visitors in historic costume and sharing details of their lives.

The American Veterans Traveling Tribute: This is the replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, DC that's touring the country. tribute to all men and women who served in the U.S. Armed Forces, the exhibit will be on display on the Windsor Town Green April 27 through April 30. The 8-foot high by 370 foot-long wall is the largest exhibit of its kind and Windsor will mark its very first visit to the Northeast. Like the actual memorial, it lists the names of men and women who died in the Vietnam War, and features computers with databases and printers to help people locate names on the wall. An exhibit of artwork by veterans of many U.S. conflicts is featured. Supplies also will be available so people can make rubbings of individual names to remember.

The visit by American Veterans Traveling Tribute is presented by Windsor's First Town Downtown organization, with the help of the Town of Windsor and the Windsor Chamber of Commerce.

ABOUT OUR ENVIRONMENT

Did you know that Walden Woods is home to two vernal pools as well as two ponds? According to the "Friends of Northwest Park", vernal pools, which are temporary areas of standing water, commonly serve as ideal breeding habitat for salamanders. This photo shows one of the vernal pools located just off Walden Meadow Road on the opposite side from the swimming pool and small pond. It drains about six acres of our common areas. You can see the pool on your way out of Walden Woods if you look to your right as you pass in front of the new *Country Walk* road that will be known as Haskins Road. Once the leaves come out on the surrounding vegetation, this vernal pool will be mostly hidden from view.



The tall yellow reeds in the pond are an aggressive and invasive weed known as Common Reed (*Phragmites australis*). Unless removed, Common Reed will take over the vernal pool and displace native plants. CWD, the Country Walk developer, has assumed responsibility for the removal of the Common Reed prior to the time our first new *Country Walk* neighbor moves in. We can expect to see the Common Reed chemically treated or mechanically removed in the coming weeks.
