THE ENVIRONMENT – ONE STEP BACK, FIVE STEPS FORWARD

Just when we thought our efforts to clean up Big Walden Pond were seeing some positive results, along comes some bad weather to reveal some other problems and set us back a bit. Unusually violent and heavy August thunder storms overwhelmed the erosion control measures in the Duplex Council area east of the pond causing a large amount of sediment to be accumulated in the pond. Fortunately, our ever-alert Environmental Committee secured the support of Windsor's Environmental Officer and the cooperation of Eli Pechtold, Country Walk's developer, to promptly correct the problem (*see below*) and dredge the sediment. Hats off to committee member John Foley for discovering the problems and sounding the alarm.



A new, longer rip-rapped channel (*left*) was constructed from Marble Faun to Big Walden Pond to prevent rushing storm water from picking up soil and depositing it in the Pond. While this was necessary and a big improvement for the environment, the channel that was constructed crosses the yellow walking trail and will require the construction of a low bridge to cross the channel. Chairperson Warren Johnson is hopeful he can convince Mr. Pechtold to build the bridge.

An enlarged plunge pool with new large rip-rap (*right*) was constructed at the main drain coming out of the Vortecnics unit at Marble Faun. The pool retains and slows the storm water that eventually proceeds along the rip-rap channel to the Pond.





Double hay bails and a silt fence (*left*) were erected along much

of the Marble Faun road between the road and the Pond to replace the old hay bail and silt fence that was rotted and washed out this month.

Screening was installed in the catch basin storm drains to prevent silt entering the basin. Large amounts of silt can be kept out of the drainage system by periodic cleaning of these screens.



And finally, curbing was built along Marble Faun to allow water flowing off the road to go through the drainage system and the Vortecnics unit instead of flowing over the road and eroding the soil.

Little Walden Pond (by the swimming pool parking lot) remains a mess of green duck weed (not algae) surrounding the fountain. Corrective action is being delayed pending a search for an environmental study company willing to conduct their study within our budget constraints. As an interim step, the Conservancy Board is considering stocking the pond with carp which are known duck weed feeders. Other biological treatments are also being considered.

BLACK BEAR PRECAUTIONS

Due to the frequency of black bear – human encounters recently, our Environmental Committee is advising everyone who uses the out of doors in a recreational or work-related function to take extra precautions. They advise all such people to wear tiny, noisy bells on their clothing to give advance warning to any bears in the area so you don't take them by surprise. They also suggest carrying "pepper spray" in case you encounter a bear and to be on the alert for signs of recent bear activity.

Learning how to tell the difference between coyote feces and black bear feces is especially important. Coyote feces are smaller and contain lots of berries and squirrel fur. Black bear feces have bells in them and smell like pepper.

WALDEN MOOD! GREEN

Amazingly enough, even when your appliances are turned off, they continue to suck energy. This "phantom load" accounts for more than 27 million tons of CO_2 emissions in the U.S. every year as well as mountains of resources wasted to produce the energy.

Also known as standby power or idle current, the phantom load totals 5 to 15 percent of your monthly electric bill.

In all, Americans spend about \$4 billion a year on electricity for things they're not even using.

To eliminate phantom loads, you've got to unplug your devices and appliances. Make it easy on yourself by using smart power strips with on/off switches you can turn off when you're not running anything, when you go to sleep and when you're away on vacation.

So go green and "unplug." You could reduce your household CO_2 emissions by 1,430 pounds a year as well as cut \$94 a year off your electric bill.
