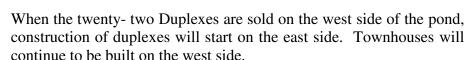
## A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT......



In case you haven't noticed, our new year started on a sour note with severe wind damage to the meeting house. The front doors, ripped off their hinges, were damaged beyond repair and we are in the process of replacing them. The French doors were also damaged badly and will be replaced later this year.

Work continues across Walden Meadow Road on the Country Walk development (see photo). Electric power is finally going to be installed

sometime in mid-February after being delayed by high winds (*see above*) that halted all new construction while crews repaired the damage throughout the state. The availability of electric power will also mean the availability of heat, which will enable the developer to complete the model homes now scheduled to be opened in March. CWD, the developer, reports that twelve units are sold so far. About half are townhouses and half are duplexes.

#### **UPDATED 'RULES' READY**

Our **Document Committee** has been busy taking care of the more mundane task of making sure all

the documents that are needed by our community from a legal, procedural and governing aspect have been updated and re-written to



reflect our current and expanding community. Last year, the committee was responsible for identifying the changes needed to upgrade the Declaration and Bylaws. Now, with a helping hand from the Standards Committee, they have incorporated recommended changes to the last of the hierarchical set of governing documents, the Conservancy Rules.

The primary focus of the committee was to get the Rules better organized for easier reference and better defined to reflect the differences between the councils, fill in the definition gaps that sometimes caused confusion, and remove the wording related to the rights and responsibilities of the declarant that no longer apply. As with the Declaration and Bylaws, the re-written Rules will be submitted as a recommendation to the Board and, if approved, will be delivered to all unit owners in Walden Woods.

#### LANDSCAPING IMPROVEMENTS

The Landscape Committee, working within the confines of the 2006 budget, has been making plans for and coordinating two major aesthetic-improvement projects to be completed this spring:

1. Upgrade the landscaping around the meeting house and install irrigation in the beds as a means to sustain



the plantings. With the assistance of Elite Management, the committee will be getting

planning input from our present landscaper as well as competitive bids from several other companies.

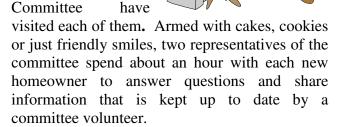
2. Upgrade the landscaping around the second set of monuments on Walden Meadows Road. There are still some issues to be resolved concerning mandates made by the town to the new developer regarding

the planting of trees near the monuments. The trees are needed as a buffer to protect the vernal pond in that area and the issue is whether the location of the trees will impact the monuments. Once the issue has been resolved as to the exact location of the trees, further research can take place and a final landscaping plan submitted to the Board for approval.

### WALDEN POND SAVED . . . . AGAIN



J. Walter, Inc., a manufacturer of industrial abrasives and chemicals, filed an application with the Windsor Inland Wetlands and

Watercourses Commission recently for square-foot construction of a 60,000 office/warehouse in the Day Hill Technology Park that abuts Walden Woods. The proposed drainage from the property sold to Walter by Griffin Land, would have increased the flow rate through the Unisource property and into Walden Woods. The Commission denied the application on January 3 in part because of the "potential impact of drainage on Walden Pond".

J. Walter, Inc. had its site plan revised to correct the impact on our pond and a Commission hearing held on February 8th approved the revised plan. Whew! ♥

## NOTICE

Because Walden Woods Conservancy is a "corporation", we have a <u>Certificate of Incorporation</u> that is registered with the state of Connecticut. It's a legal document that basically describes how the Conservancy operates as a Common Interest Community.

When homeowners assumed control of the Conservancy in 2004, we re-wrote our Declaration to reflect how we now govern ourselves under a Board of Directors elected by Council. The Certificate of Incorporation, therefore, also needs to be amended. Our legal counsel, Attorney Matt Perlstein, has done that and the re-written document will be submitted to the Board for their approval this month.

If approved by the board, it must then be voted on by unit owners at a special meeting to be held in March. All homeowners will receive a copy of the certificate with a notice from Elite Management announcing the date and time of the meeting. If two-thirds of the unit owners attending the meeting vote to approve the certificate, it will then be ratified and registered with the state to replace the existing certificate
