Ball Field News



As you may have noticed, there hasn't been much use made of the ball field this year. At least one Little League team involving several Walden Woods residents as players or coaches were using the field earlier for practice, but were requested to stop due to liability issues relating to potential injuries suffered by nonresidents. Attempts are being made to obtain a liability waiver from the Little League organization, but no word has been received from Williamsport. In the meantime, no practices are being held on the field.

Swimming Pool News

Thanks to Pool Attendant Lauren Atwater, we have some interesting statistics regarding the use of the pool this year – at least for the month of June. According to the visitor's log diligently maintained by Lauren, there were 518 visitors to the pool in June, 373 of whom were residents and 145 guests. Discounting the six "bad-weather days" that affected attendance, that's an average daily attendance of more than 15 homeowners and six guests. At least one resident from 60 of the 183 occupied homes in Walden Woods (33%) visited the pool in June. A study of the Log reveals the following Council breakdown: 30% of Country Walk homeowners, 24% of the Village homeowners, 38% of Woodmoor and a whopping 48% of all Ridge homeowners came down for a dip or just to watch the dippers.

If you were one of the visitors, you probably noticed the damage to the wooden vents in the cabana cupolas caused by some squirrels trying to sharpen their teeth. The vents will be replaced once we determine the costs of using various alternative materials.

A new bike rack has been purchased and will soon be installed outside the pool to accommodate those of you trying to save a little gas. A cigarette receptacle is also being purchased for placement outside the pool area. There is no smoking allowed inside the pool area.

Tennis Court News

To make the old tennis court more usable, we are looking into the possibility of installing a wind screen and a backboard. Measurements have been taken and pricing will be submitted to the Conservancy Board for consideration prior to installation.

Tennis players are asked to please secure the gates after use by securing the lock-cables with no slack so that the gates cannot be opened wide enough for entry while still locked. Yesss, the fences are low enough to be climbed over, but let's not make it too easy for trespassers.

Feng Asian Bistro, 93 Asylum Ave, Hartford, 860-549-FENG

Whether for a special occasion, holiday party or to really impress a first date, the Feng Bistro is the hip place to be. This very urban

and chic restaurant, which opened last fall, has been hyped by many food critics as "it is so good, it belongs in Chicago or Boston."

This is definitely not your typical Japanese restaurant. The pacific-rim style menu has something for all diners – rib-eye steak, fresh seafood and lamb just to name a few. And, of course, it has an extensive variety of the freshest sushi around. While it is not the place you would typically dine on a weekly basis, it is definitely worth the visit. I have been lucky to dine there twice and both times I've walked away saying I can't wait to go back.

An appetizer worth trying is the Lemongrass Lobster Latte or Kobe Beef (at \$10 an ounce!!). And, because their menu changes seasonally, you won't be disappointed by any of the entrees or specials. As for dessert, you'll wish you had left room for seconds of the Green Tea Brulee or the Chocolate Chip Sandwich!

VILLAGE COUNCIL ASSESSMENT

As previously reported, Village Council homeowners face a dilemma in trying to pay for the remaining fence replacements while trying to maintain an adequate reserve to pay for expected and unexpected capital expenditures. The majority of homeowners who responded to Joe Palladino's survey indicated a preference for bank financing as a means to solve the problem. Unfortunately, not enough homeowners responded to qualify this as an opinion of the majority of all Village homeowners and without that vote, the Conservancy Board could not approve their support of a bank loan. The bank's refusal to consider anything other than a Conservancy loan makes this an impossible path to follow.

After sharing this information with homeowners attending the June Village Council Board meeting and listening to their input, board members decided to continue paying for the fences through the normal budget process and impose a special assessment fee on Village Council homeowners to help build up the reserves.. The amount of the fee and when it will be imposed will be decided upon at the Village Board's meeting on September 24th. There will be no Village Council meetings in July and August.
