NEWS FROM THE BOARDS

CONSERVANVCY BOARD: Because it's summer and members of the Conservancy Board of Directors deserve a vacation like the rest of us, **there will be no Conservancy Board Meeting in July.** The next scheduled Board meeting is August 27th.

COUNCIL BOARD VACANCIES: Special Meetings of the Village and Townhome Council homeowners will be held shortly to elect new Directors to fill vacancies. Homeowners living in these two Councils who are interested in serving as a Director for the remainder of 2008 may have their names placed in nomination at the applicable meeting. One new Director for each of the Councils will be elected by homeowners attending the meetings (a proxy is enclosed for your use if you cannot attend). ADDITIONAL RELATED NEWS:

Village Council – Due to an increasing number of scheduling conflicts, Mary Ciaraldi decided to resign as a Village Council Director. The Special Meeting to elect her replacement will be held during the Village Council Board Meeting on July 28th. In the meantime, Joe Sikora, a previous Director, has graciously volunteered to temporarily fill the vacancy so that the Village Council is adequately represented on the Conservancy Board.

Townhome Council – Edgar Rodriguez has moved out of Walden Woods and his replacement as the Townhome Council Director will be elected during a soon to be announced Special Meeting of Townhome homeowners. Shivraj Vichare, appointed by the Conservancy Board, is temporarily filling in as the Director.

Our thanks to Mary and Ed for their many contributions and sacrifices while serving as Council Directors and as their Council representatives on the Conservancy Board. And our thanks to Joe and Shiv for stepping up to volunteer their time and energy when they were needed.

LEASING A HOME IN WALDEN WOODS

Walden Woods was designed and constructed with the intent of being a community of owner-occupied homes. Because we recognized the reality that, like any other community, we may occasionally have homeowners who want or need to rent their homes, our governing Declaration and Rules documents contain specific information relating to the limitations and the process involved in renting. Every homeowner agrees to abide by these governing documents before they purchase a home in Walden Woods.

The reason for this opening homily is that some homeowners are apparently **not** complying with the rental process and may be subject to fines or legal action. According to Section 1.1.5 of the RULES document, "All rentals.... require advance notice to and permission from the Conservancy and require owners to file copies of written leases with the Manager (Elite Management)."

And, according to Section 10.5 of our Declaration, ".........to preserve the character of Walden Woods as originally established.......all leases must be in writing and filed with the Association. Failure to so file will permit the Association to bring summary process against the tenant as a default in the lease in the name of its landlord........ No Unit Owner may lease any Unit which he or she owns until he or she receives a Permission to Lease."

Other rules and restrictions apply and should be read before a homeowner initiates steps to rent his or her home.

Did you know, for instance, that there are products you probably already have in your cupboards that you can use to clean your house instead of using commercial products containing harmful chemicals?

- Bathtubs, drains, ovens, tile floors: Use baking soda made into a paste.
- Drain de-clogger Try white vinegar mixed with warm water.
- Windows and glass Vinegar and water (1/1 ratio)
- Sponges Use natural cellulose or unbleached cotton cleaning cloths you can wash. You can use cut-up sponges at the bottom of your potted plants to retain moisture.
- Use glass bottles whenever possible.

And if you don't feel like making up your own concoctions, always look for the Green Seal certification on products you buy. It identifies those products that meet the health and environmental standards for cleaning products.

Incidentally, log-in statistics kept by the two girls indicate there were 638 visitors (residents and guests) to the pool in June. That's a 23% increase over last year's usage.

Residents should also be reminded that you must accompany any friends or relatives visiting the pool area. Exceptions can be made to this rule but must be approved by a member of the Board of Directors so that the Pool Attendants can be properly notified.
