Environmental Committee News:







The Environmental Committee finished the blue trail entrance on Last Leaf Circle. The entrance received nearly 200' of new crushed stone to alleviate two major problems: overgrowth and drainage. The committee's volunteers cleared brush, weeds and poison ivy, and sprayed the poison ivy, too.

The trail signs were refurbished and new rustic-style stained 4 x 4 pressure-treated posts have been installed. These are similar to the ones by the U.S. Park Service and the Connecticut DEP for state parks. Committee Chair, Glenn Brand, says, "It's always nice to use rustic materials for sign structures in these types of settings to keep in balance with a more natural look."

In the next few weeks, the committee will clean mold and debris from the small bridge that crosses the trail on Last Leaf Circle. A few structural issues that need attention on the bridge will be addressed as well.

Glenn says, "I wish more of our residents would walk the beautiful trail system we have on the property. It's an easy walk and full of charming age-old hardwood trees and conifers all mixed in with an array of wild mammals and reptiles that live on our property. It's quite a treasure-filled little Ecosystem that we really are fortunate to have here".

The Fisher cat is Back in full Force in Connecticut

The fisher is neither a fish nor a cat. It is a relative of the North American marten. The marten differs from the fisher in that it is smaller in size. It is sometimes referred to as the Pine Marten.

Adult fishers weigh between four to 15 pounds and are between 26 - 49 inches in length. Males are about twice the size of females. The smallest females have been recorded to be as small as three pounds. The males have been recorded as large as 20 pounds. Their coats are dark brown, with a black tail and legs. Some fishers have a cream-colored patch on the chest. All four feet have five toes with retractable claws. Because they can rotate their hind paws 180 degrees, they can grasp limbs and climb down trees headfirst.

A circular patch of hair on the central pad of their hind paws marks plantar glands that give off a distinctive odor, which is believed to be used for communication during reproduction. Fishers are also known for one of their calls, which is often said to sound like a child screaming, and can be mistaken for someone in dire need of help.

Their numbers drastically declined about a hundred years ago in Connecticut as they were hunted for their brown to black furs.
